### Regular Agenda

Agenda Item 1. Council reviewed the Sarpy County Sheriff's monthly service report.

**Agenda Item 2.** Motion by Murtha, seconded by Craney, to proclaim Sunday, June 7, 2020, as National Cancer Survivor Day in the City of Springfield. AYES: Swenson, Herzog, Murtha, Craney. NAYS: None. Motion carried.

Agenda Item 3. Craney reviewed his concerns for opening city-owned ball fields, including enforcement of state and local health directive measures (DHMs). Shane Ehrke, Jason Jones and Travis Riley with SYAA and Chad Metzger and Jim Lynam with SBA addressed Craney's concerns and noted that both organizations would be following the guidelines imposed by the Governor for baseball practices and games. Council discussed whether or not to open the restroom facilities for use by the baseball teams. They considered alternatives such as renting portable restroom facilities or not offering restrooms at all. SYAA and SBA members reviewed restroom cleaning procedures they have put into place. Craney noted that he would like the concession stands to remain closed. Both SYAA and SBA said that they plan to open the concession stands as per the Governor's guidelines. Mayor Roseland and Murtha noted they were okay with prepackaged items. Craney expressed concern with procedures to switch teams at the end of games. He would like to have exact start and end times for games to help transition teams on the field. Metzger said that the dugouts and equipment will be sanitized between games. Players must remain in their vehicles in the parking lot until current teams are off the field and out of the park area. Jones and Metzger thanked the Mayor, Council and city staff for all of the work done on this item.

Council Member Swenson introduced **Resolution 2020-19** and moved its adoption. Council Member Craney seconded the foregoing motion and on roll call on the passage and adoption of said resolution, the following voted YEA: Swenson, Herzog, Murtha, Craney. The following voted NAY: None. Whereupon the Mayor declared said motion carried and said resolution passed and adopted. A true, correct and complete copy of said resolution is as follows:

RESOLUTION 2020-19

## COVID-19: Resolution of the Springfield City Council Regarding Use of Municipal Property for Sports or Other Recreational Activities

A Resolution of Springfield, Nebraska, Regarding the Risk of Exposure to COVID-19 Through the Use of Municipal Property for Sports or Recreational Activities.

#### Recitals

WHEREAS, the novel coronavirus, COVID-19, has been declared a worldwide pandemic by the World Health Organization, is extremely contagious, and is believed to spread mainly from person-to-person contact; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the Governor of the State of Nebraska declared a state of emergency related to COVID-19 within the entire State of Nebraska, and this state of emergency remains in effect; and

WHEREAS, directed health measures are in effect for every County in the State of Nebraska through May 31, 2020, and are likely to be extended by the Governor in some form for most or all Counties after May 31, 2020; and

WHEREAS, on May 21, 2020, the Governor announced that the directed health measure prohibiting all organized team sports, youth and adult, would be relaxed by the State of Nebraska beginning June 1, 2020, in order to permit the planned reopening of certain adult and/or youth team sports; and

WHEREAS, a copy of the *June 1<sup>st</sup> Statewide Sports Reopening Guidelines* is attached to this Resolution and incorporated herein as part of these Recitals; and

WHEREAS, it is anticipated that future guidance from the State of Nebraska will permit additional team sports and other recreational activities; and

WHEREAS, players, coaches, officials, and others who participate in such games, practices, or other recreational activities, and spectators who attend such activities risk the dangers of illness, disease, medical complications, injury or death, caused by or related to COVID-19, by voluntarily entering the municipal property and/or facilities on which such activities take place, by watching such activities, and by participating or authorizing the participation of a minor, in such games, practices, or other recreational activities; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the City of Springfield to permit the resumption of adult and/or youth team sports and other recreational activities on municipal property and/or facilities, in accordance with the directed health measures and other laws and guidance issued by the State of Nebraska, including, but not limited to, the *June 1<sup>st</sup> Statewide Sports Reopening Guidelines* and such further laws and guidance that may be issued in the future, provided that every individual, organization, or group sponsoring such activities, and all participants and spectators, fully assume the health risks associated with these activities, including the inherent risk now present in any such activities as a result of the presence of COVID-19 in the State of Nebraska, and provided that participants in such activities sign an agreement that releases the City of Springfield, its elected and appointed officials and

employees, and all other participants in adult and/or youth team sports or other recreational activities from liability associated with exposure to COVID-19 in the course of such activities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Springfield, Nebraska that any individual, organization or group sponsoring adult and/or youth team sports or other recreational activities that wishes to use the playing or practice fields, courts, grounds, and/or other facilities of the City of Springfield for games, practices, or other recreational activities will be required to enter into the COVID-19: License and Management Agreement for Use of Municipal Property for Sports or Other Recreational Activities attached hereto. These License Agreements will be maintained by the Municipal Clerk and shall constitute an addendum to any other contract, license agreement, lease, or agreement allowing the use of the municipal property and/or facilities of the City of Springfield by the same individual, organization, or group.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, in order to enter the playing or practice fields, courts, grounds, and/or other facilities of the City of Springfield to participate in games, practices, or other recreational activities, all players, coaches, umpires, officials, concession stand workers, restroom attendants, parent volunteers assisting with dugout management and other participants must sign the agreement titled COVID-19: Participants Agreement for Sports or Other Recreational Activities as attached hereto. Each team wishing to participate on or use the municipal property and/or facilities of the City of Springfield must provide copies of signed Agreements for all participants affiliated with the team, together with a roster containing a complete list of the names of all players, coaches, umpires, officials, concession stand workers, restroom attendants, parent volunteers assisting with dugout management and others affiliated with the team. Copies of these documents must be provided to the Licensee of the License and Management Agreement for Use of Municipal Property for Sports or Other Recreational Activities prior to participant's involvement and shall be maintained by Licensee. Upon request, copies of these documents must be made available to the City of Springfield.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, for the avoidance of doubt as to the risk assumed by participants and spectators, in order to encourage compliance with directed health measures and guidelines, and in order to promote public safety, the applicable provisions of the *June 1st Statewide Sports Reopening Guidelines*, shall be posted on all practice and playing fields, courts, grounds, and/or other facilities where adult and/or youth practices and/or games or other recreational activities occur. If the *June 1st Statewide Sports Reopening Guidelines*, are subsequently modified or updated, the applicable provisions of the modified or updated guidelines shall be posted in the same manner.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that all participants and spectators shall comply with all federal, state and local laws and regulations, all directed health measures and guidelines, and all security policies or procedures established by the City of Springfield relating to COVID-19 or other safety or hygiene precautions while present on municipal property and/or facilities, understanding that the City of Springfield may elect to deny entrance to its playing or practice fields, courts, grounds, and/or other facilities to any non-complying participant or spectator, or to require a non-complying participant or spectator to leave the premises at any time.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that officials and employees of the City of Springfield are authorized to execute the directives set forth in this Resolution.

RESOLVED this 2<sup>nd</sup> day of June, 2020.

## RESOLUTION 2020-22

## Resolution granting authority to the Mayor to declare an emergency

**WHEREAS**, the City of Springfield, Nebraska by and through its City Council hereby authorizes the Mayor to have the following temporary authority, until such time as a full ordinance related to these matters can be adopted:

- 1. The Mayor shall have the authority to declare an emergency within the City whenever conditions arise by reason of war, conflagration, flood, heavy snow storm, blizzard, catastrophe, disaster, riot or civil commotion, or acts of God, including conditions, without limitation because of enumeration, which impair transportation, food or fuel supplies, medical care, fire, health or police protection or other vital facilities of the City.
- 2. The Mayor is hereby authorized, if s/he finds that the City or any part thereof is suffering or is in imminent danger of suffering civil disturbance, disorder, riot or other

occurrence which will seriously and substantially endanger the health, safety and property of the citizens, to declare a state of emergency.

- 3. Whenever, in the judgment of the Mayor, or, in the event of his/her inability to act, the Council President, an emergency exists within the City, s/he shall have power to impose by proclamation any regulations necessary to preserve the peace and order of the city.
- 4. After proclamation of an emergency, or any order thereunder, the Mayor or other person authorized to do so under this article shall forthwith provide for notice thereof to be given to members of the Council, and any state or other local agencies are required under Nebraska Law.

WHEREAS, whenever a state of emergency has been declared as provided for herein the following is authorized for a period of 72-hours. Any orders after 72-hours shall be approved by the City Council.

- 1. The Sarpy County Sheriff may issue an order prohibiting or limiting the number of persons who may gather or congregate upon the pubic highways, public streets, or public sidewalks, or in any outdoor place, except persons who are awaiting transportation, engaging in recreational activities at a usual and customary place, or peaceably entering or leaving buildings.
- 2. The Sarpy County Sheriff may establish a curfew limiting the hours when persons may go upon or travel the public streets.
- 3. The Mayor or his/her designee may require the closing of cocktail lounges, taverns and bars and prohibit the sale or service of alcoholic beverages in any hotel, restaurant, club or other establishment, and require the closing of all other business establishments.
- 4. The Mayor may prohibit or restrict the sale of gasoline or other inflammable liquids.
- 5. The Mayor may prohibit the sale, carrying or possession on the public street or public sidewalks, or in any public park or square, of weapons including, but not limited to, firearms, bows and arrows, air rifles, slingshots, knives, razors or missiles of any kind.
- 6. The Mayor, his/her designee, or the Sarpy County Sheriff may do any and all things and take such measures as are necessary to preserve the health, safety, and property of the citizens of this community.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SPRINGFIELD, NEBRASKA, that the above measures are authorized when a state of emergency is declared.

and moved that the statutory rule requiring reading on three different days be suspended. Council Member Craney seconded the motion to suspend the rules and upon roll call vote on the motion the following Council Members voted AYE: Swenson, Herzog, Murtha, Craney. The following voted NAY: None. The motion to suspend the rules was adopted by three-fourths of the Council and the statutory rule was declared suspended for consideration of said ordinance. A true, correct and complete copy of said ordinance is as follows:

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 1029**

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF SPRINGFIELD, NEBRASKA, REGARDING GRANTING POWERS TO THE MAYOR TO MAKE DECLARATIONS OF EMERGENCY AND RESTRICTIONS OF ACTIVITIES; TO ADOPT CHAPTER 1 ADMINISTRATIVE, ARTICLE 1 ELECTED OFFICIALS, SECTION 1-101.01 CITY MAYOR; DECLARATIONS OF EMERGENCY AND RESTRICTIONS OF ACTIVITIES; TO HARMONIZE WITH STATE LAW; TO REPEAL CONFLICTING ORDINANCES AND SECTIONS; AND TO PROVIDE AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SPRINGFIELD, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. Chapter 1, Article 1, Section 1-101.01 of the Springfield Municipal Code is adopted to read as follows:

§1-101.01 City Mayor; Declarations of Emergency and Restrictions of Activities. The Mayor shall have the authority to declare an emergency within the City whenever conditions arise by reason of war, conflagration, flood, heavy snow storm, blizzard, catastrophe, disaster, riot or civil commotion, or acts of God, including conditions, without limitation because of enumeration, which impair transportation, food or fuel supplies, medical care, fire, health or police protection or other vital facilities of the City. Pursuant to Nebraska Revised Statute §81-829.50, the Mayor has the ability to declare an emergency. This Ordinance grants the Mayor, his/her designee, and the Sarpy County Sheriff, as the law enforcement agency within the City, powers to restrict activities after the declaration of an emergency. Said orders shall only be in effect for seventy-two (72) hours. Any extension required after 72-hours will required council approval.

- 1. The Mayor is hereby authorized, if he/she finds that the City or any part thereof is suffering or is in imminent danger of suffering civil disturbance, disorder, riot or other occurrence which will seriously and substantially endanger the health, safety and property of the citizens, to declare a state of emergency.
- Whenever, in the judgment of the Mayor, or, in the event of his/her inability to act, the Council President, an emergency exists within the City, he/she shall have power to impose by proclamation any regulations necessary to preserve the peace and order of the City.
- 4. After proclamation of an emergency, or any order thereunder, the Mayor or other person authorized to do so under this Section shall forthwith provide for notice thereof to be given to members of the Council, and any state or other local agencies are required under Nebraska Law.
- 5. The Sarpy County Sheriff may issue an order prohibiting or limiting the number of persons who may gather or congregate upon the pubic highways, public streets, or public sidewalks, or in any outdoor place, except persons who are awaiting transportation, engaging in recreational activities at a usual and customary place, or peaceably entering or leaving buildings.
- 6. The Sarpy County Sheriff may establish a curfew limiting the hours when persons may go upon or travel the public streets.
- 7. The Mayor or his/her designee may require the closing of cocktail lounges, taverns and bars and prohibit the sale or service of alcoholic beverages in any hotel, restaurant, club or other establishment, and require the closing of all other business establishments.
- 8. The Mayor may prohibit or restrict the sale of gasoline or other inflammable liquids.
- 9. The Mayor may prohibit the sale, carrying or possession on the public street or public sidewalks, or in any public park or square, of weapons including, but not limited to, firearms, bows and arrows, air rifles, slingshots, knives, razors or missiles of any kind.
- 10. The Mayor, his/her designee, or the Sarpy County Sheriff may do any and all things and take such measures as are necessary to preserve the health, safety, and property of the citizens of this community.

Section 2. Any other ordinance or code section passed and approved prior to passage, approval, and publication or posting of this ordinance and in conflict with its provisions is repealed.

Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in full force from and after its passage, approval, and publication or posting as required by law.
